Additionally, we had an eye-opening conversation with an award winning South African journalist Deejay Palesa Manaleng about how the media portrays and tells the stories of people with disabilities (PWDs). Ms Palesa is the current lead for Wits University research on how the media potrays PWDs. She advocates for the inclusion of PWDs in the storytelling of natural disasters, emphasizing that their perspectives and experiences are crucial for comprehensive coverage. She also stresses the importance of representing PWDs in the media profession through the adoption of assistive technologies that can facilitate their participation and contribution.

Empowering Gender Equality: Insights from the Gender Training in Addis Ababa

On 28–29 August 2024, the Embassy of Sweden in Ethiopia organized a gender training workshop at the Ramada Hotel in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, with 41 participants from SIDA staff and partners in attendance. The workshop was a pivotal step towards promoting gender equality in development initiatives and signaled the growing recognition of the importance of gender equality in sustainable development. Empirical research has linked empowering women has been directly linked to productivity and in turn economic growth.

The training, led by gender expert Viktoria Saxby, delved into key gender concepts, gender-transformative approaches, and practical tools for gender analysis and budgeting. Through interactive sessions, participants learned how to integrate gender perspectives at every stage of program design, implementation, and evaluation, ensuring that development efforts benefit both women and men equally.

A standout discussion held focused on the power of gender transformative approaches—strategies that actively challenge and shift harmful gender norms. By reshaping societal structures, participants explored how development programs can go beyond gender mainstreaming and foster long-term, positive change. Participants gained valuable skills and a deeper understanding of how to integrate gender perspectives into their work, promoting more inclusive and equitable development.

A key takeaway was the significance of gender budgeting, an approach that ensures resources are allocated equitably. Through practical exercises, participants saw how gender-sensitive budgets can address disparities, especially in sectors like education and healthcare. Morocco's successful gender budgeting model was highlighted as a prime example of how these strategies can improve women's access to essential services.

The training concluded with key recommendations, including the need to engage men and boys in gender equality efforts and enhance leadership for gender-sensitive practices.

The Embassy of Sweden reaffirmed its commitment to gender equality as a central pillar of its development cooperation, paving the way for more inclusive growth in Ethiopia and beyond.

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PWD should own their stories- WITS researcher proposes.

In 2014, Palesa Deejay Manaleng's life changed due to a cycling accident that left her paralyzed from the waist down. Facing both physical and emotional challenges, she adapted to life in a wheelchair and found strength in paraathletics. Despite these challenges, she has continued to break barriers, demonstrating that disability does not limit one's potential. She now advocates for greater inclusion and accessibility for people living with disabilities, embodying perseverance and courage.

As a part of her advocacy work, Palesa is currently leading the research on Persons living with Disabilities, (PWDs)in South Africa conducted by Wits University under the CHARM program. From the research findings PWDs have been sidelined when it comes to the way their stories are told in the media, including having their voices stifled in situations of national calamities in South Africa.

"There's a parent who said to me that the biggest problem with how society treats people with disabilities is because of the media. They portray their stories as people who are cursed, weak, helpless and a burden, and treated harshly due to what they have seen in the media," said Palesa, the Journalist.

She points out that the assumption that there are no persons with visible or invisible disabilities in any catastrophe has effectively silenced them.

"We have witnessed informal settlements razed down, strikes by miners and other mass actions in Johannesburg and it's hard to believe that there are no PWD in these scenarios. Journalists should be deliberate in including them in every storyline instead of looking for how to separate them as the only way to change society," said Palesa, Journalist.

In her view, Deejay thinks that media houses should appoint PWDs to leadership and management positions. This would improve issues related to reasonable accommodation and the development of policies for them. She notes that when it comes to employment of PWDs in media houses, many think they are doing PWD a favor, despite their qualifications, including academic credentials.

She advocates for the adoption of new technologies for journalists who are PWD, emphasizing that such advancements can significantly enhance their ability to contribute effectively

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








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
